3 companion-animal food

Steer Clear of Laboratory-Tested Companion-Animal Food

Many companion-animal food manufacturers, including Iams and Menu Foods, conduct painful, invasive, unnecessary tests to measure the "metabolic energy" of dog and cat food. During the tests, dogs and cats are forced to live in small stainless-steel cages or barren, cement runs for years on end without so much as even a resting board to lie on or a loving hand to touch them.

Compassionate consumers can feed their animal companions healthy food that has not been cruelly tested on other animals. To see video footage of the tests and/or to learn which brands are home-tested, not lab-tested, log onto IamsCruelty.com.

Contribute to Your Alma Mater Only After It Stops Testing on Animals

Some of the experiments conducted at colleges and universities have to be seen to be believed. For example, a PETA undercover investigator at the University of North Carolina saw baby rats being doused in ethyl alcohol and then having their heads cut off with scissors, mice with implants breaking through their skin, rats with huge sores and oozing scabs around the devices implanted in their skulls, and bags of still-breathing animals in the freezer.

Experimenters at Johns Hopkins University receive federal funding to make drug addicts out of nonhuman primates. At Hebrew University in Israel, experimenters saw open the skulls of conscious, restrained monkeys and insert electrodes into their brains, purportedly

to test memory activity, although one researcher admitted that "we did all kinds of nonsense, simply so we [could] do something." Some medical and veterinary universities still use horrendous "dog labs," although most abandoned the practice years ago.
