Re: Request for Investigation of Apparently Injured Bear and Distressed Monkey at Pocono Snake & Animal Farm

Dear Dr. Goldentyer:

I am writing on behalf of People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA) to request that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) promptly investigate reports of a bear struggling to walk and a squirrel monkey in apparent distress at Pocono Snake & Animal Farm ("Pocono"; license no. 23-C-0011).

A concerned citizen visited Pocono on March 24 and documented that a bear appeared to favor his or her right foreleg and struggled to lift both hind legs while walking and climbing in a concrete enclosure. Forcing a bear to stand and walk on concrete can cause arthritis as well as skin and foot problems, in apparent violation of 9 C.F.R. § 3.128 (requiring that "[e]nclosures shall be constructed and maintained so as to provide sufficient space to allow each animal to make normal postural and social adjustments with adequate freedom of movement. Inadequate space may be indicated by evidence of malnutrition, poor condition, debility, stress, or abnormal behavior patterns"), id. § 2.131 (b)(1) (requiring that "[h] andling of all animals shall be done as expeditiously and carefully as possible in a manner that does not cause trauma, overheating, excessive cooling, behavioral stress, physical harm, or unnecessary discomfort"), and id. § 3.125(a) (requiring that "[t]he facility must be constructed of such material and of such strength as appropriate for the animals involved. The indoor and outdoor housing facilities shall be structurally sound and shall be maintained in good repair to protect the animals from injury and to contain the animals"). A screenshot taken from the footage depicts what appears to be a worn or cracked left hind footpad (attached).

Please ensure that hard substrate is not contributing to these apparent injuries and that this bear is receiving adequate veterinary care as required by 9 C.F.R. § 2.40.

The citizen also <u>documented</u> that a squirrel monkey was exhibiting apparently stereotypic behavior, sitting almost motionlessly in a fetal position for minutes at a time. The footage shows that the monkey's tail is almost entirely bald, potentially the result of excessive self-grooming brought on by stress or of an incompatible cage-mate. There appears to be blood on the monkey's tail, and the citizen reported a cut on the animal's leg. The citizen also informed PETA that there was no way for the monkey to remove himself or herself from public view.

Oakland 554 Grand Ave Oakland CA 94610 510 763 PETA This squirrel monkey is apparently being exhibited in violation of 9 C.F.R. § 3.81(c)(2) (requiring that "[c]ertain nonhuman primates must be provided special attention regarding enhancement of their environment, based on the needs of the individual species and in accordance with the instructions of the attending veterinarian. Nonhuman primates requiring special attention are ... [t]hose that show signs of being in psychological distress through behavior or appearance") and § 2.131(d)(1) (requiring that "[a]nimals shall be exhibited only for periods of time and under conditions consistent with their good health and well-being"). The behavior and apparent injuries depicted in the video indicate that this squirrel monkey is in need of veterinary care, in accordance with 9 C.F.R. § 2.40, and that the enclosure must be inspected to ensure that primate psychological welfare standards are being met. Please also evaluate two reportedly elderly capuchin monkeys who are similarly suffering from hair loss, potentially due to infectious or endocrine disease, nutritional imbalance, and/or self-inflicted trauma (photographs attached).

Please hold Pocono fully accountable for any and all violations that you discover during your investigation.

If violations are found, enforcement action appropriate for the circumstances will be initiated.
