Dear Ms. Glaros:

I'm writing from [TeachKind](#), PETA's humane education division, which works with thousands of educators throughout the U.S. to bring compassion into the curriculum. We understand that complaints have been made to law-enforcement officials about a video possibly circulating that may depict Sharon Middle School students torturing a mother cat and her kittens to death, then mutilating their bodies.

In light of this disturbing account, we urge you to equip your staff with tools to prevent similar horrific incidents, and we're offering our free resources—including "[Empathy Now](#)," **our step-by-step trauma-informed guide to addressing and preventing youth violence against animals**—to that end. Because this incident has gained media attention and your students have likely heard about it, it's important to address the issue. This comes mere weeks after a report out of [Philadelphia](#) regarding two juveniles' cruel treatment of animals and a similar incident in [Bucyrus, Ohio](#), in January, possibly indicating an alarming trend in your area.

As mental-health and law-enforcement experts well know, [cruelty to animals](#) and violence against humans are inextricably linked. Many educators are aware that serial killers and school shooters tend to have a history of cruelty to animals, but it's also common for young people to have witnessed the abuse of animals, which can be a [form of trauma](#), and children who have observed acts of cruelty to animals are more likely to abuse animals themselves. Schools can help mitigate the effects that traumatizing incidents in their community can have on students.

Given that [young people all around the country are acting out and becoming violent](#), likely in part because of the challenges and trauma resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic, it's vital that schools set a standard of compassion. According to [Pennsylvania law](#), teachers are encouraged to give lessons in "[c]aring, including kindness, empathy, compassion, consideration, generosity and charity." Another [Pennsylvania law](#) states, "Instruction in humane education shall be given to all pupils." Incorporating compassion for animals into your schools' curriculum would help you to reach susceptible kids before they engage in violent behavior.
