			notified by plant personnel about a large number of dead red broiler
			chickens within a cattle trailer on the premises. The cattle trailer had tall
			solid sides with a row of open windows along the top of each of the side
			walls (approximately 6 inches high, with an extra bar running down the
			middle, splitting each into two long windows) and a small, open window
			at the front of the trailer. The chickens were loose (not in crates) on the
			floor of the trailer. No additional ventilation was provided (i.e. fans, et
			cetera) to direct any breeze to the level of the floor. The trailer was
			located in the sunlight with the back door closed, with an outside
			ambient temperature of approximately 88 degrees Fahrenheit at 1100.
			REDACTED REDACTED had performed antemortem inspection of those
			chickens before they were placed in the cattle trailer (while they were
			still in the client's shipping trailer) at approximately 0800, when the
			ambient temperature was approximately 78 degrees Fahrenheit, and
			found them to be healthy, well feathered, well fleshed and with no sign
			of disease or heat exhaustion during the time of that inspection. Plant
			personnel reported that when they last checked the chickens in question
			inside the trailer at 0900, the chickens had been alive and well, but by
			1100, 130 of the chickens had died. Sixty-six chickens were still alive
			within cattle trailer at that time. REDACTED REDACTED notified the
			Chain of Command, who also notified APHIS REDACTED and the Des
			Moines District Office. REDACTED REDACTED REDACTED arrived at the
			plant to perform inspection of the remaining 66 chickens during the
			slaughter process. REDACTED REDACTED found minimal sign of disease (a
			few breast blisters, scant airsacculitis) and no sign of severe disease such
			as cyanotic combs, torticollis, severe airsacculitis or hemorrhages in the
			trachea or viscera in any of the chickens. REDACTED REDACTED
			concluded that the deaths were consistent with overheating in the poorly
			ventilated cattle trailer during a hot summer day. She shared her findings
			and conclusion with the Chain of Command. The APHIS REDACTED
			agreed with her diagnosis and declined to investigate an infectious cause
			for the deaths. Failing to protect chickens from high environmental
			temperatures with inadequate ventilation and thereby inducing heat
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exhaustion prior to slaughter is not consistent with good commercial
practices. The establishment has since removed the cattle trailer from
the premises and determined not to use it as a pen to hold birds during
hot days.
