Freeing Captive Wildlife from Exploitation

For decades, PETA has fought against the exploitation of captive wildlife—from roadside zoos, circuses, and aquariums to laboratories and canned hunting ranches. This work is led by our Captive Animal Law Enforcement (CALE) division, a specialized group of highly trained attorneys, wildlife specialists, veterinarians, and support staff that pushes federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies.

Across four nail-biting episodes, HBO's *Chimp Crazy* gave millions a glimpse into PETA's high-stakes legal battle with notorious animal broker Tonia Haddix. While viewers cheered at the dramatic rescue of Tonka—the chimpanzee at the heart of this headline-grabbing series—it was the relentless work of a committed group of lawyers, veterinarians, and wildlife experts with **PETA's Captive Animal Law Enforcement (CALE) department that made his release possible.**

This expert team uses every legal tool at their disposal to protect captive wildlife and build a future in which no animal is exploited and abused for something as trivial as human entertainment.

Since 2012, CALE's work has secured the release of 800 animals from roadside zoos, private owners, traveling shows, and breeders. Hundreds more have been confiscated by law enforcement and regulatory authorities as a direct result of CALE's work.

Among the many animals CALE team members have helped rescue is Joe, Tonka's brother. In 2016, we sued a roadside zoo in Alabama that kept Joe in solitary confinement. Forced to work in the entertainment industry since he was a juvenile, Joe spent nearly two decades in a barren enclosure no larger than a dog run. After we filed suit—alleging that the roadside zoo was violating the Endangered Species Act by isolating Joe from other members of his species and denying him a complex environment—the facility agreed to release Joe.

CALE staff frequently facilitate the transfer of rescued animals to reputable sanctuaries, and Joe is now thriving alongside Tonka and other chimpanzees at Save the Chimps, an accredited sanctuary in Florida.

PETA's Recent Victories for Captive Animals



Seedy mall aquariums shutter in shame:

After nearly six years of confining hundreds of animals in squalid, hellish conditions—and following a PETA campaign and a company-wide bankruptcy declaration in December—the SeaQuest mall aquarium in Roseville, Minnesota, shut its doors. Following pressure from PETA, Seaquest locations in Colorado, Connecticut, Georgia, and Texas have also closed, and PETA stopped SeaQuest from opening facilities in Florida, New York, and North Dakota.



Cruel exotic-animal auction shut down:

Two federal lawsuits that cited evidence provided by PETA have barred Mt. Hope Auction in Ohio from holding its triannual exotic-animal auction. After PETA first put the horrific auction on the government's radar in August 2022, the USDA cited Mt. Hope Auction for violating the federal Animal Welfare Act 69 times in less than two years. The auction had served as a Who's Who cesspool of seedy wildlife breeders, dealers, and roadside zoos, and its closure has caused a big blow to the cruel exotic "pet" trade.

Another circus goes animal-free:

Following requests from more than 50,000 PETA supporters, Mysterious Circus in Texas has gone animal-free. The venue sparked outrage last year when it used a geriatric elephant named Okha in its lineup of spectacles. Okha was stolen from her family and her natural home decades ago and has been forced into sideshow performances ever since. PETA is urging circus exhibitor Brian Franzen to retire Okha and the other captive animals in his care to accredited sanctuaries.



Pamela Anderson's Zuzu Apple Nut Dog Treats

Ingredients

- 2 cups oat flour
- $\frac{3}{4}$ cup unsweetened applesauce
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup smooth nut butter (with no additives)

Instructions

1. Preheat the oven to 350°F/180°C. Line two baking sheets with parchment paper.
2. Combine all the ingredients in a medium bowl.
3. On a lightly floured surface, roll the dough out so that it's $\frac{1}{4}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ inch thick. Cut out treats using a bone-shaped cookie cutter or any shape you love. Place on the prepared baking sheets. Reroll the scraps and cut again.
4. Bake for 30 minutes. Let cool and store in an airtight container at room temperature or in the fridge.

Makes 12 to 24 servings.

Brittany Peet: Harnessing the Power of the Law on Behalf of Captive Animals

As general counsel for Captive Animal Law Enforcement, Brittany Peet leads an interdisciplinary team of attorneys, a veterinarian, captive wildlife experts, and researchers who work on behalf of animals held captive in roadside zoos, traveling shows, and the film and television industries. The Captive Animal Law Enforcement team achieves victories for captive wildlife via legal and regulatory actions as well as public advocacy campaigns and legislation.

Brittany often represents PETA in the media and has appeared on HBO's *Chimp Crazy* and Netflix's *Tiger King*. She also negotiates and coordinates wild- and exotic-animal rescues for PETA and has overseen the rescues of hundreds



Another Chimp Crazy Win! Tonia Haddix Pleads Guilty to Lying to Feds

Chimp Crazy villain Tonia Haddix has pleaded guilty to perjury and obstruction of justice for lying about Tonka the chimpanzee's whereabouts and defying a court order to surrender him to PETA. Haddix's sentencing is set for this summer, and PETA hopes she will face jail time. Shortly before her pleas, a U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) administrative judge declared Haddix "unfit to be licensed" and terminated her exhibitors license. The CALE team filed multiple complaints and provided a mountain of evidence of animal welfare violations by Haddix before the judge's decision.

of animals, including 80 bears, 78 big cats, and 25 chimpanzees—including Tonka.

Meeting a sad, lonely bear held in a roadside zoo inspired Brittany to make advocating for captive animals her life's work: "I remember Smoky, a bear trapped in a cramped cage in a park near my hometown.

He died without ever stepping outside. I knew he and other animals like him deserved so much more. I believe that people can be inspired to change their views. We had a bearskin at home from an animal my father shot and killed. He eventually put away his hunting rifle, and I know others can do the same and join us in standing up for all animals who are suffering."

Brittany joined the PETA Foundation's legal department in 2009 and lives in Michigan with her beloved PETA-rescued dog, Leonard.



Augustus was one of the 17 macaque “Silver Spring monkeys,” most of whom were taken from their jungle home and purchased by animal experimenter Edward Taub for testing purposes. After PETA exposed the extreme cruelty and neglect that were being inflicted on Augustus and the others in Taub’s laboratory at the Institute for Behavioral Research, the police raided it, and Taub became the first experimenter to be convicted of cruelty to animals. Augustus’ noble image, dignity, and innocence make him a fitting symbol of the plight of all animals who have endured—and are still enduring—abuse at the hands of humans. His story has inspired countless PETA members to leave a legacy that will help create a future in which all animals are treated with kindness and respect.
